English 4 Honors/College English I is a dual-credit class through Central Community College. Students will receive credit for meeting the high school English 4 Honors curriculum as well as college credit through CCC. Focus is on students' developing their abilities to write with clarity, confidence, and conviction through regular practice, which will include various genres (argumentative, exposition, personal narrative, persuasive, informative, and research writing). Particular attention will be given to the role of planning, writing, and revising as part of the writing process.

Additionally, the curriculum includes vocabulary, grammar, and various genres of British literature (which includes poetry, short stories, novels, and drama). Students will learn the skills and terminology appropriate for discussing literary works and their historical and cultural contexts, as well as language and its social roles, with special attention given to the origin and development of the English language from Old English to the Modern Era. The course includes universal issues presented from various viewpoints and analyzing language, imagery, and writing styles across the centuries. Students will read to determine plot and to gain a sense of the work as well as to discuss and write about it successfully. Students will practice interacting with their texts by highlighting, making notes, and annotating as they read. The course requires close reading, critical thinking skills, and precise language usage for both writing and speaking.

Students will be expected to write often. Selections from literature will inspire composition assignments, giving students the opportunities to write to understand, explain, and evaluate. Final drafts should be as close to error-free as possible, with close attention to diction, syntax, grammar, and Standard English usage. Writing will also incorporate short, in-class composition, collaborative works, and peer review of writing assignments. In addition to various compositions, students will complete one major research project each semester.

Course Objectives:

Throughout this course, students will

- Analyze and revise their own writing.
- Summarize and synthesize material from texts in a variety of written genres.
- Construct and/or answer literal, inferential, critical, and interpretive questions.
- Use multiple writing strategies to generate ideas, organize information, guide writing, answer questions, and synthesize information.
- Use MLA and APA format to demonstrate formal academic writing.
- Revise to improve and clarify writing through self-monitoring strategies and feedback from others.
- Communicate information and ideas effectively in a variety of modes, using a variety of media and formats.
- Self-monitor comprehension and apply appropriate strategies to understand complex text.
- Evaluate the author's purpose, perspective, rhetorical style, and contextual influences.
- Critique, analyze and evaluate relationships between elements of literary texts and the effects of authors' use of literary devices.
- Cite specific textual evidence to evaluate and analyze literary and informational texts.
- Provide oral, written, and/or digital descriptive feedback to peers.
- Recognize the origin and development of the English language through a study of language and the origin, development, and current nature of words.
- Build general academic and content specific vocabulary through readings and vocabulary specific course work.
- Use correct spelling, grammar, punctuation, and conventions of Standard English usage.
- Turn work in on time and meet the expectations of the course.

Elements of the course:

- Regular composition writing, with rewrites and corrections on each paper.
- Study of a wide variety of British literature in various genres.
- Emphasis on grammar and usage.
- Weekly vocabulary, focused on Greek and Latin roots.
- Daily work, including quizzes, homework, assignments.
- Research project: Argumentative paper in MLA formatting (First semester); Research paper APA formatting (Second semester).
- Use of technology to enhance instruction, take tests, and publish written work.

Assessments:

Semester grades:

- Quarter #1: 45% of grade.
- Quarter #2: 45% of grade.
- Semester test/final: 10% of grade.

Grading for this class:

- Tests, writing assignments and major projects: 45% of grade.
- Quizzes and major assignments: 30% of grade.
- Daily work/homework: 15% of grade.
- Notebooks/Notecards/Outlines/Organizational tools: 10% of the grade.

Grades will be taken an average of two or three times weekly (Approximately 18-27 grades each quarter.).
