Course Description: This course will be an introduction to Economics and Financial Literacy. The first portion of the course will be covering topics such as: economic systems and Theories, the interworking of the capitalistic market, and how to be responsible after high school in regards to their financial literacy. In the financial literacy portion of the course, we will be using Dave Ramsey's material. Students will learn how to: 1) create a budget 2) save money 3) pay off debt 4) and invest for the future. Throughout the course, students will have the opportunity to practice skills through interactive exercises and real world scenarios.

Course Objectives:

- 1) Explain the basic foundations of Micro and Macro Economics.
- 2) Explain the different Economic Systems and Theories.
- 3) Explain how Supply and Demand work.
- 4) Explain and apply basic methods to save and budget their finances.
- 5) Explain and understand the purpose of credit and the dangers of debt.
- 6) Explain the role of taxes and choosing the right carrier.
