Homework

Citizenship Test

As part of this class, you'll have to take and pass the American Citizenship test. By "pass," that means you must get 90%. This will be a large summative test grade that will be spread across both quarters (50 pts. in first and 68 second). You can take this test

as many times as you need throughout the semester and won't be put into the gradebook until after each quarter. You will have three chances to pass it in class, after that the responsibility to come in and take it is on you. There are 128 questions and to get full credit for the exam, you need to get a 115/128.

- You get your 50 points for the first quarter when you answer 50 questions correctly
- You get your 68 points for the second quarter when you get 90%

Late Work Policy

Late work will be accepted for up to 80% credit until the end of the unit the assignment was in. Once the unit test is over, the homework will no longer be accepted.
